Doris May Chatlain Morgan a daughter, cowgirl, sister, wife, mother, aunt and teacher.

Doris May (Chatlain) Morgan 94 of Springdale died, February 24, 2008 in Springdale. She was born on the family ranch in Valier, Montana, April 24, 1913, to Arthur F. and Bessie King Chatlain.

Her parents, her brothers Paul and Phil Chatlain, and her husband Edward D. Morgan whom she married in October of 1942, preceded her in death.

Survivors include their children; son, Dr Edward C. Morgan and wife Linda of Temple, Texas, daughter, Cheryl Miller and husband Steve of Springdale and daughter, Renee Flynn and husband Bill of Little Rock, a sister June Chatlain Sands of Billings, Montana, Seven grandchildren, two great-grandchildren , and many nieces and nephews in Montana and Arkansas.

Doris was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church in Pine Bluff and served on the vestry and altar guild.

Doris graduated from Valier High School in 1931 and received her Bachelor's degree from Wooster College in Wooster, Ohio in 1935, and did graduate work at the University of Oregon. She taught English, Journalism, Algebra and

French for over 30 years starting at schools in Montana and later at Pine Bluff High School from 1951 until retirement in 1973.

Doris was an avid reader, enjoyed playing bridge, earning her "life Masters" in duplicate bridge, and loved to travel.

Doris knew how to draw the best out of a person, and she would sometimes ask penetrating questions that would require some honest reflection. “What is better,” she would say, “to talk about ideas, talk about people, or talk about things?” “What is the most important quality your life should have?”

“People are more important than things.” She loved to pack a picnic lunch and just drive out to a pretty spot to enjoy the outdoors together as a family. The darndest stories about Edward, Cheryl, and Renee would come out in a setting like this, and maybe some of the best jokes, too! She knew hard work as a child growing up on a ranch in Montana, and she adored having a good time with family and friends.

Although I never played bridge with her or knew her in the classroom, I can imagine how much she enjoyed those activities. She truly loved people. She was a natural-born storyteller with a twinkle-in-the-eye sense of humor, and she always knew an appropriate quote to fit the situation. One quote that stuck with me all these years is by Robert Frost, “Home is the place where, when you have to go there, they have to take you in.” Anytime you were around Doris Morgan, you felt at home, regardless of whether you had to be there or not! You KNEW you were loved.

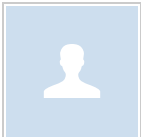
