William (Bill) Keith Thornton, 84, of Elm Springs, formerly of East End in Saline County, passed away February 2, 2023.

He was born near McCrory, Arkansas, to Willard and Irene Thornton. Growing up the son of sharecroppers in the Grays community gave him the character and ideals that stayed with him

his entire life. His first job on the farm was waterboy, taking drinks to his family in the field. He had many adventures as a kid along the Cache River and returned often to remember those

times. He loved to talk about joining his brothers at their favorite swimming hole. His curiosity

and adventurous spirit led him to be one of the first to explore Half Mile Cave (now Blanchard

Springs Caverns) with friends from Forrest City in 1956 and to join the United States Air Force in 1957.

He was an electrical engineer for 30 years at Southwestern Bell. In retirement he furthered his hobby as an artist and restored antique radios.

He and his wife traveled nearly every back road in Arkansas looking for old barns and cotton

gins to photograph and eventually paint. They also enjoyed classic country music, bluegrass

concerts, flea markets and visiting family.

He is now reunited with his parents, his sister Emma Lou, and brothers Emmett, Hershel and Wayne.

He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Dalene; his children Kimberly (Brandon), Kyle (Amanda),

Kevin (Megan) and Tina; sister Betty Sue Harwell (J.C) and ten grandchildren.

His family is grateful to his caregivers Chronicle, Kaylin, Jessica and Jo Ann, and the staff at

Circle Of Life. Per his wishes, there will be no service.
